The April GCW Project Challenge turned out to be one of our more successful, with a total of 12 projects being presented. They included a wide range of project types and again showed off the wide-ranging talent and creativity our GCW members possess. For this challenge there were 2 participation categories.

Category 1 was open for any project type to enter. Each participant in this category received a raffle ticket for a drawing to win \$25.00. We had 6 entries for category 1. Category 2 was to make something using a construction 2x4. The 2x4 could be any standard 8' board (Douglas fir, redwood, pine, etc). The 2x4 could also be re-dimensioned as needed to make the project. A \$5 entry fee was collected from each entrant in category 2 to be added to a prize pot. There were also 6 entries in category 2.



Each Project Challenge entrant presented their project much like we do for our show and tells and each is shown individually later in this newsletter.

The winner of the Category 1 raffle was Bob Prichard, receiving \$25 plus a certificate. His project was a pine toolbox. For Category 2, club members voted to determine their favorite of the 6 entries. The winner was Judy Prichard for her set of books with book ends project. Jim obviously put some time into his 2x4 project, a box of vegetables. Making the box is one thing. Creating, shaping and painting all the vegetables is quite another. They do look like they're ready for the salad. The box is painted with yellow milk paint and the finish for all is shellac.

A 2x4 never looked so good. He used about 6 feet to create the deck and the balance to fabricate the sides and end handles. By using different size blocks and alternating the grain orientation he created a very unique cutting board/serving tray. He used mineral oil to finish this piece.

Ron Sexton



Ron made a unique storage box using, yep, using a 2x4. The top sections slide apart to provide box access. He used dovetail rails to attach the lid sections. He found that he had to adjust the rail dimensions a number of times do to wood movement. The lesson, pine is a mover... In addition he lubricated the rails using carnauba wax. This box features some of Ron's fine pyrography art. I wouldn't want to run into this wolf on a dark night. He finished the piece using lacquer.

Category 2 2x4 Project Challenge. The edge binding lettering was done using a CNC router system. She used an Early American stain to color the book covers. Hot glue was used to attach the covers to the wood blocks that made up the pages. Slight saw kerfs were used to create the illusion real pages on the blocks. The 2 pieces shown on the right are all that remains of the 2x4 she used. This creative project won the Category 2 Project Challenge. Good work and congratulations Judy.

The wheels will be turned from Brown Maple. The other jig, a jam chuck, is used with the wheel chuck to turn the "really" small parts for the truck. He went into some detail on how he created the jigs. I'm looking forward to seeing the final product.

Jim brought in several projects to share. The Bowl is California Cedar, turned while green. The vase is Walnut with Wenge accent. Both bowl and vase are finished using the Beall

Buffing system. The pens include 1 made from dyed plywood. All use 20 carrot kits and are finished using Jim's CA coating process.


