
GCW NL Brief:

Show-N-Tell (5 members):


Susan Settle

his practice piece to help develop his carving skills. He chose pine as it is soft and fairly easy to carve. The challenging part, he said, was to develop the setup to be able to hold/support the work. He said that he is having to learn a lot about special carving tools. Besides the knives he is also making use of a power rotary carver. Part of the effort includes researching and developing a pattern to work from. I'd say his first attempt is moving along just fine.

He said the challenge was getting the segment angles just right. Yep, that's what the challenge is... Once he mastered that, he said, all went well. He sanded to 320 and finished it with polyurethane.

April 2019 GCW Project Challenge Projects , Wood Art (11 entries):

Basil Borkert



Basil entered this five pointed star. The challenge for this project was to setup and machine the angles so it would go together without gaps. Each star point is made up of 2 pieces. To accomplish the task he created the table saw jig shown above. The wood comes from scrap at a building site. He used paint for the nice blue finish. Note the inner and outer star design.

Bob's art entry is a turned platter. The wood used is unknown but it has some really nice grain figure. His brother brought it from Texas and wanted to see Bob's CNC expertise in action. So Bob programmed the CNC to create the spiral design on the platter. Don't ask for the CNC program from BOB as somehow the program got lost. That makes this project one of a kind, right. He used lacquer for the finish.



Ron Sexton



Ron entered his squirrel plate for this project challenge. He turned it from Oak using a face plate. The artwork is all pyrography. The challenge was to create the images on an Oak pallet. Oak is an open and coarse grain wood, so it can be a real chore. But Ron enjoys the challenge. The coloring was done using acrylic pencils and paint. The edge scalloping was accomplished using a drum sander on the drill press with the aid of a jig.

John entered a pyrography art piece based on a vintage picture of his family's farm in Iowa. He burned it on Birch which has a tight grain (highly desired when doing pyrography). The edges of this piece were scalloped using a sanding drum on the drill press.

Homer Rail



Many of us have known Homer to be an artist amongst his many talents. He brought this fantastic piece of art to share. He created it using, scratch art. This is something he has been doing for a while now. This picture took several weeks to complete. The base material is a white Masonite pre-inked black. He uses a #11 Exacto knife to scratch out the image and water based acrylic artist paint to color. He said that he saw the crocodile during a visit to Australia. He commented that

animals with fur are much easier than a croc which is made up of smooth plates. The fur is easier to detail with scratches. He has been a member of the Placerville Art Association for about 10 years now.

The Maple border is made up of segments with the end grain showing. I'm sure there was a discussion on whether to hang it vertical or horizontal.

Roy continues to explore the West Coast Indian lore. He has created a number of totem pole pieces based on West Coast Indian traditions. Here he shows a piece based on a tradition that some had to help keep their kids from running off into the woods and getting lost. It is called the "wild man of the woods". Basically it was created to scare the *\$%#* out of em so they'd stay home. The challenge in making this piece, he said was finding the hair. He tried barber shops to no avail. Then he found a red wig at the local hospice thrift store and dyed it black. It is obvious that Roy is having a blast working in this ARTFORM. Ok, got to ask, who did he use a model?

For John's art entry he brought a contemporary clock he created. The primary wood is Maple with, what looks like Mahogany for the facing. The clock mechanism was originally gold. He sprayed the hardware black to give it that special contrast. This one will hang on a wall.
