I created this bench and cocktail table that sit outside my shop. The wood is Blue Oak and has lots of cracks in it. It was cut from a tree on my property and sectioned with a chain saw. It was smoothed using a belt sander. I filled the cracks and coated the top of it with polyurethane. When I started some of the polyurethane ran through the wood and out the other side. I just kept coating it with poly and letting it fill up the cracks. The bench is about 6 to 8 inches thick and rounded. I work on old cars and the legs for the bench are old, unusable Model T Ford axles. I bored holes into the wood for the shortened axles. It was little tricky to get the legs lined up. They are all slanted to the outside to ensure

stability. With the solid steel legs and Oak it is a heavy bench and very stable. The cocktail table is another piece of Blue Oak and is supported by half of an unusable Model T Ford rear axle housing. I had to weld a plate on the top that is screwed to the piece of Oak. The original bolt holes in the axle housing at the ground level have stainless steel bolts so while resting directly on the ground it will prevent rust stains. It has been sitting outside for a year now and is holding up well to the weather.

My wife needed wall-mounted racks for her ever-expanding collection of quilting rules and templates. I used Redwood 2x6 stock to hold the rules. The slots were cut at a "fat" 1/8 inch. The racks were mounted at 15 degrees on Baltic-Birch brackets. They were then finished with matte spray lacquer.



This Redwood step stool was from heartwood cutoffs and scaled to use the wood available. The top is 10x18, 12 inches tall and finished in clear Tung Oil with spray poly finish just on the top.

I harvested a good sized mistletoe infested Oak limb section from a neighbor's downed tree a few weeks back. It had been down for some time and was good and dry. I really like the challenge of taking this, what should be, firewood and creating something unique. Picture 1 shows the raw halved section of the limb piece. Picture 2 shows my method of trimming the section using a cordless chain saw resting on a small table that mounts in my lathe's banjo. This method provides stablility so I can trim away exactly what I want. Picture 3 shows the rough turned bowl before any filling/repair. Picture 4 shows the start of the filling effort. The primary filler used was 15 minute epoxy dyed black and filled with brass key shavings. This was used to fill the large mistletoe limb holes and

build up sections of the bowl's rim. For smaller areas that were punky or pitted I used CA with wood dust or brass powder. I experimented a lot with this project testing ideas for coloring, filling and finishing. On one area that shows up as a wrinkled surface in picture 3 I filled using epoxy mixed with a gold pigment powder. The powder comes in numerous colors that appear to be somewhat iridesent and I will be playing with it more in the future. After sanding and touching up pin holes I applied a CA finish using numerous coats of thin and minium CA to both the bowl and the Cherry pedistal. The finished dimentions are 6" tall and 8" in

diameter.
