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YouTube Woodworking Presentation:



We had a presentation by members Wesley Aring and Tim Bynon on YouTube videos and how they can be used to expand our woodworking knowledge. Wesley is well versed on the topic YouTube videos as he has been producing them for the last 3 years. They mainly cover various aspects of woodworking showing how-to for numinous woodworking projects. He has created over 140videos so far and has over 18,000 subscribers. They can be found by just searching Wesley Aring on YouTube's search line. Woodworking related YouTube videos can vary from complete project instructions to simple tips and tricks.

Wesley gave our members a good introduction on how to access and use the YouTube access channels on the web. He also gave a brief on various techniques used by YouTube video producers and how he has progressed in the production of his own videos.

At the beginning of the presentation he passed out some fliers that show the basic method of searching for videos of interest and a list of channels he recommends covering woodworking topics. The flyer is shown on the next page. During the presentation Tim and Wesley showed 3 videos to demonstrate how YouTube access can be useful in our search for woodworking knowledge. 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

Robert Garlick





Roy came across an interesting new wood based product and thought it should be shared with our members. It is made by Sonoma Mill Works and is dubbed VinoPlanktm. It is made using "Toasted Oak Sticks" sticks that have been placed in wine

fermenting tanks to add the "woody" flavor that enhances wine's bouquet. Rather than trashing after use, the sticks are recovered and laminated together to create material that is stronger than an oak plank and quite beautiful. The varied colors come from the red and white wines they were soaked in.

John Brideson




John presented his latest furniture project to the members. It is a Queen Ann style, two drawer nightstand created to match his bedroom set. This was a special request from his wife. The wood used is Red Oak stained to honey oak and finished with semi-gloss polyurethane.

Homer made this specially designed easel for friend. Like Homer she is into creating "Scratch Art". You may remember the April project challenge where Homer brought in some of his very fine examples of scratch-art. This easel features an adjustable stand and a non slip pallet that can swivel. Primary wood is Pine.

Craig brought in this unique bottle opener he made. He incorporated a stainless steel bottle cap opener available from Ruth Niles. The wood used is Chechen (see description below). There is also a host of unique bottle stoppers available from the Ruth Niles website. A distinguishing feature of these stoppers is being able to set upright on a counter top (see inset). Ruth Nile Website

<u>Chechen is an exotic Mexican wood</u> with a wide range of color variation from dark chocolate to light butterscotch colors. Chechen has an irregular grain pattern, and coupled with the color variety it makes fantastic finished pieces. Chechen is also hard and dense, which allows the wood to polish to a high sheen without effort.

Looks like we need a "Mug Shot" of Craig. I'll check with

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

were Walnut and Maple. The recesses were first hogged out by drilling and the outer shape was cut on the bandsaw. Then with the aid of the templates shown, he was able to use profile router bits to refine the shapes. Note, due to the length of the shaping bits, he found it necessary to route using his router table. A round-over bit was used to ease all the edges.

Sanding was accomplished with the aid of sanding disks on sponge pads. John offered to loan out the patterns to any member wanting to create their own tray.

AS we all know, John loves to make toys. Especially mechanized toys. In this endeavor he uses a lot of wheels. He purchases most of his wheels. He has found ways to modify these wheels to make them look more authentic. The process he is has now uses involves dying the wheels black, replacing the centers with undyed dowel sections for contrast then drilling and inserting dyed axles.

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Member Contribution:





This is an update on my recent experience with Lacquer that is available now in California. I recently bought a gallon of Gemini Precat Satin Lacquer. I noted that it's listed VOC (Volume of Organic Compounds) has gone down from what was available at 680 grams per liter to now being 240. The main problem now is the lacquer dries too fast. This prevents the finish from flowing out as it should. You can add a retarder to slow down the drying time. However, thinning the product more can possibly cause a run problem if you're not careful. If you are good with a spray gun you can do as I did and increase the flow to lay down a heavier coat, being careful not to create any runs or sags. The other thing I noticed is that the lacquer does not smell like Lacquer.

But in all fairness the finish looked really good despite the additional VOC reduction. We bought a gallon of Sealer and Satin lacquer and the cost was around \$88, representing a significant price increase since I bought the last time.
