#### For Starters:

Ron Sexton kicked this meeting off with some tips on how to use Shellac Filler Sticks to repair voids/defects in their wood projects. The fact that there is a shellac based product to use as a filler, was I'm sure, news to some members present. He described the process he used to repair a small void in the center of a small platter he turned. The void, he explained was created by turning the platter too thin. The process involves shaving small amounts of shellac from Shellac Filler Sticks using a razor blade tipped iron, smoothing the filler into the void, then sanding and polishing to level the surface. The repair ends up being hard and durable ready for your finish of choice. The shellac filler sticks come in various colors. Ron likes using the amber product for his small repairs. One of many manufactures of this product is Liberon who also makes a number of fine wax products for the woodworker.



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### Video Night:

Tim Bynon showed 2 videos for our members to view and comment on. The first was a step by step tutorial on the construction of a jewelry chest. The second was a step by step tutorial on making segmented "Peppermint" Christmas ornaments. Both were informative and offered a number of ideas and fabrication techniques.

No stranger to unique form, Harvey has done it again. He showed us 3 new turned projects. The bowl is a piece of Oak he rough turned a year ago. It looks like he was able to maintain some of the natural edge while finishing it up. The 2 vases show his love for form, showing a sense of the Roman style. Keeping the natural base is definitely a new one and sets these pieces off. The left vase is Cherry and the Right is Malberry. The Malberry required significant filling before being painted.




woods are Walnut and Maple. He described it as an End-Grain cutting board as it incorporates pieces of maple glued up with the end grain exposed. It features routed finger hold recesses on both ends and measures approximately 15"x11". He used his homemade thickness sander to get a uniform surface and finished it using mineral oil. He described the bowl as a "phone holder". Believe it was for his Mother-In-Law to replace a porcelain one she broke. The pizza cutter he made from a kit. The turned handle has a threaded insert to receive the cutter mechanism.

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#### Roy Carter



A whimsical bird house was brought in by Roy. Don't think we have ever seen anything like this one. The roof is definitely unique in its 1950 hair style wave form. He used a pattern and cut segments from rafter material to make the roof wave. He then laminated them together and refined the shape by sanding.

#### John Roberts




No stranger to making toys, John shows a couple of his latest pieces. He described the pattern he worked from in making the truck and elaborated that the plans included zero instructions but was printed at full scale. The locomotive was patterned after one he found in a book. Both units incorporate Walnut and Maple and were finished using polyurethane spray.

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#### Gail Cone



Gail brought in 2 projects to share. The photo above shows 4 Memory Boxes made for the Keaton Raphael Memorial Foundation. The woods used were Camphor sides 3 units, Cherry sides 1 unit, and Maple lids. The heart inlays are Blood Wood. The finish used was TungOil. The vase was turned from an Oak crotch with Walnut bottom and top. The Oak had a bark intrusion all the way through. All defects were lined with brass shavings and then filled using plastic resin tinted black. It features a CA (Cyanoacrylate) finish.

### **Exchange Corner:**

Rockwell wood lathe, reconditioned. It has a variable pulley drive system so you don't have to change belts to different pulleys. It has a 18" swing and 48 inches on center bed. It is 1hp single phase 220vt with a vary-pulley system variable zero to 3500 rpm. The lathe breaks down into 3 easily managed pieces. The pedestal weighs approximately 275 lbs. It has been moved many times using a dolly. It is 76" long  $\times$  55" tall. This machine purrs. Asking \$1100, however price is negotiable.
