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
GCW Newsletter Brief:

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V-Show-N-Tell (5 Members):

The idea for this project came about when I saw a couple of them on Pinterest. The balloon is purple heart, Maple, Cherry and Wenge. The base is Walnut, Yellow Heart, Purple Heart and maple. The balloon is finished inside and out with Danish oil and several coats of water base poly. The balloon and basket is 12 inches high and 7 inches in diameter. Wall thickness is about 1/4", the basket is 2" sq.. The top of the balloon (focus ring included) was turned

basket is 2" sq.. The top of the balloon (focus ring included) was turned separately from the cone and finished on the inside before bonding the two together. The Purple Heart star and the Yellow Heart ring in the base is an inlay about 1/8" thick.

I constructed these Jewelry boxes out of reclaimed Beech hardwood flooring. The lid panels are Purple Heart veneer over Baltic Birch plywood surrounded by inlaid patterned banding. The corner splines are Purple Heart. I was aiming for a "piano" like gloss finish. The exterior of the boxes were finished using a French Polish technique on 13 coats of polyurethane. I found that with the contours and edges it was a very laborious process... no fun but I was pleased with the results. The interior was finished with simple Johnson Paste Wax

over the raw wood. The box design was challenging as there were several table saw cuts of varying depths and angles made after the boxes and lids were assembled. The cuts had to be exact. My reward... hugs from my daughters!

This is a Blue Oak firewood chip I salvaged from splitting my firewood. I liked the shape so I mated it to a piece of Bottlebrush trunk also from my property and proceeded to sand it. Then I did a wood burn of an oak limb and leaves with acorns. The wood burn was rather difficult to do because there was not a large enough surface to rest my hand when burning the design but I persevered. I finished it with several coats of lacquer.

picture shows a piece turned from Sycamore and is 9"x1.5". Red, yellow and black dyes were used to produce the coloring of the rim (note the resulting orange variance). The Lower 2 pieces are turned from Box Elder and are approx. 6"x1.4". For the bottom left piece I used blue, magenta, and yellow to produce shading variances including purples and greens. For the bottom right piece I used blue and yellow to produce shading variances including greens. This last bowl was my prototype for shape development and for working on my dye and finish application techniques. It had been stripped and turned a couple of times. The rim finish on all 3 is can spray lacquer, many coats and then rubbed out. The technique for obtaining the shading variance involves application(s) of a desired primary grain enhancing dye and then sanding to varying degrees, usually sanding from inside rim edge toward the outer edge of the bowl. Depending on the wood in the project, more or less sanding sealer may be needed to help produce the desired dye saturation. Note that the dyes are wiped on and the variance in colors depends on the placement and combination of dyes being applied. The dyes I used are ARTISAN dyes from Craft Supplies USA (also known as woodturnerscatalog). They are spirit (alcohol) based and contain 3% shellac so they also act as a sealer. The TransTint dyes are also spirit based but do not contain shellac. Note, the red bowl's bottom just has a black dye applied and then sanded to highlight the grain. Black was out of stock so I used TransTint


Black dye and added shellac for my own dye mix (it worked). Take care. Gail
