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February Carving Presentation by Ed Santarosa:



We had a great presentation in the art of woodcarving by Mr. Ed Santarosa. Ed is a member of the Capital Woodcarvers Club and graciously agreed to come share with us his knowledge in the craft of woodcarving. He opened by sharing that his interest in carving goes way back to when he was a kid. He followed up by listing the various classifications/types of carving and showed a number of examples of these types of carvings. They included chip carving, carving in the round, carving in the flat, and relief carving. Some pictures are provided on the next page representing each.

The highlight of this session was Ed's live demo showing us how to carve a face profile and explaining the general guidelines to determine the spacing of facial features. For example, he provided spacing information for placement from top head to eye 2/5, to nose 1/5, to lips 1/5, to chin 1/5. He used a square block of wood for his demo explaining that you want to apply the basic profile on a corner. He spent some time on what the objective of a carving should be and whether you are looking to depict realism or a caricature,

During his demo he explained the need to use stop-cuts to prevent unwanted chip-outs from using either push or pull cutting. That is a down cut where you want your carve to stop. Also covered was the need to use hand/finger protection to help prevent injury. Good carving results depend on your tools being extremely sharp.

A few other bits of information were shared with our members, many as a result of several questions from out members. What types of wood are best for hand carving? Basswood is his favorite but explained that closed and tight grain woods are preferred. Another question was on what types of coloring did you use. He generally uses either acrylic artist paints or water colors depending on the effect he wants. When using acrylics he thins the acrylic and applies a number of coats depending on the color intensity he is looking for.

Above is just a brief snapshot of what was presented during Ed's presentation. We really appreciate the referral by Michael Jay that brought Ed to give us this presentation. Again, thank you.

If you are interested in carving and would like to look into it further, the Capital Woodcarvers meet the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Wednesday each month from 10AM till 12 noon at Woodcraft Supply in Sacramento.

I call the project on the left my leaf box. It is Silver Maple and I used pyrography in the center of the bowl and the lid to outline the leaves. I drew the leaf on paper then glued it to a heavy paper-back veneer. This was then cut out on my scroll saw. I then traced the leaf design onto the bowl and lid. Using my Colwood pyrography set with writing pyrography pen I stippled the back ground (set at 5.5 heat range). After stippling I burned in the veins on the leaves. I added 2 coats of Amber Shellac to add a contrast to the burned area. The knob is Black Acacia wood. I finished it with 1 coat of Lacquer sanding sealer then 3 coats of Semi-Gloss lacquer.

The project on the right was turned from an Olive wood branch I bought from Ken Merrill when he was closing out his shop, I finally got around to turning it. The bowl is not that unique, but what I wanted to show was the beautiful grain and color. I also sprayed my usual Lacquer finish on it.

The small box was turned from an oak branch infected with mistletoe. The variation of colors and texture are amazing. It is 3 1/2 " by 3 1/2 ". It has 3 coats of Waterlox Satin finish. It is being used to store fish food. Thank you, Harvey, for the wood. I'm now looking for more mistletoe wood every time I'm in the woods. The Shallow bowl was turned from Siberian Elm. Its weathered cracks give it an old rustic look. It is 9" diameter by 2

"high, finished with 3 coats of Waterlox Satin. Thank you, Gail Cone, for the wood. See you all next month.

Here are 2 of the projects I showed at the February meeting. The vase incorporates Maple Burl, Ebony and resin and is approx 7"H x 2"Diam. The resin has blue Alumilite dye and blue mica powders added for the color and texture effects. The Maple segments had their live edges set facing each other in the resin form. The tube for the vase is vacuum fit.

The ring/jewelry box is approx. 5"H with finial and 3" in Diam. The primary wood is Purple Heart with the accent wood being Yellow Heart.

The body is made up of 16 staves and the lid has 16 segments. Finial is Blood Wood. The lid has a vacuum fit. Both projects were finished using abrasive paste compounds and wax applied on the lathe.
