### Wooden Boat Building Presentation:

For the May meeting we had a detailed presentation on wooden boat building by Jerry Preston, Tim Bynon and Nelson Exum. Each traded off during the presentation to cover specific topics. This was a well prepared presentation where they showed numerous supporting slides. This is only a short summary to give a brief glimpse into the topics presented. The first part of the presentation tried to give us an idea of what should be taken into consideration before taking on a boat building project. Thought should be given to things like the boat's purpose, your budget, your skill level, hull type, speed, materials, power source, and design. Ok, design, Jerry Preston went over design criteria using a number of charts to show relationships between water/hydro dynamics and hull design and given the performance desired. Materials, well we are talking wooden boats here, so a number of hull fabrication forms for wooden boats were described to us by Tim Bynon. A few that he mentioned were Cold Mold, Strip Planking, Carvel, Constant Camber, Clinker Built, Sheet Plywood Stitch and Glue. Last but not least the topic of joinery in boatbuilding was covered. Another grandson, another rocking Motor Bike. The primary wood used in this rocker is Beach and Walnut. The handle bars are made

from Jacoba wood. It took Jim approx. 60hours to complete this project. The fenders were made by laminating 2 boards together to gain the desired thickness. Refer to the Wood Focus section for more information on Jacaba Wood later in the newsletter.

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#### John Roberts



As we all know, John loves to make toys. He has shown a number of his toy projects at our show and tells. As time went by he decided to tackle making his own wheels, truck wheels at that. He designed the Jig shown here, to allow him to apply the chevron tread pattern on his truck wheels. He uses it on the table saw. The jig on the right is used to drill the index holes for the tread pattern spacing. To aid in this endeavor John found the following website to be quite useful. #### John Brideson



A friend of Johns asked him if he could create a carrying case for an Elks ceremonial dress collar. The case was made using Maple Burl (from Woodcraft). John created the Elks emblem using pyrography, freehand no-less. On the inside he applied red flocking. The dress collar is held in place using a foam riser plus foam in the lid, much like a gun case. Rare earth magnets were used to secure/latch the lid.

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#### Wesley Aring



Wesley designed and fabricated this fine chest of drawers. The dark wood is Sapele and the light wood is Hard Maple. The drawer fronts were cut so the faces have matching grain patterns. Rail guides provide the drawer slides. He said it took him 10 hours to make. He finished it with just mineral oil. Note the unique joinery he used for the sides, top and bottom. #### Bill Meronek



Bill has now entered the wonderful world of wood turning. Shown left are his first. They were turned from Ash. He made use of his new Nova Chuck from Rocker Woodworking and used the mentoring services of Harvey Myers to help with the finer points of getting started. They turned out great don't you think?

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#### Harvey Myers



We really enjoy Harvey bringing in his whimsical art. There is no limit to Harvey's imagination. Here he shows what an old Holly log can become. Well why not a home for a giant slug. The eyes were to be blue but he dropped one. So now he's known as old white eyes.

#### Gail Cone



Gail has started turning again. These 3 pieces were turned green, seasoned and then returned. The 2 end pieces are Maple while the middle bowl is Almond. The distinctive coloring of the Maple pieces is due to the tree trapping water for a long period before being felled.

All 3 pieces were finished using Tung Oil slightly cut with mineral spirits to allow better flow. 000steel wool was used between coats (3-4). 000 was used to create the mat finish for the piece on the right. The rim texturing was created using a knurling wheel and then colored using artist's acrylic paint. The dark rings were created using wire burning.

Ed likes to visit local second hand stores in the chance he will fine some treasure(s). He found this unique box constructed of contrasting wood species. Turns out it is a puzzle box. Simple one but fun just the same. Actually looks like it would be a fun project to do. Maybe even a theme for a future Project Challenge..

#### Paul Velk



Paul made this fine craftsman style display case for his Granddaughter. He used Philippine Mahogany and it's relative, Sapele. He saved a ton of \$ by cutting his own glass for the shelves. He was not sure if doing it himself was going to work but all when well. The case features a hidden drawer much like the one Ron Sexton incorporated into his Spice Cabinet. The case also features a built in light. He finished it by rubbing in amber bee's wax.

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#### **Wood Focus:**

SAPELE Wood (taken from Wikipedia)

Common names: Sapele, Sapeli, Sapeli. Native to tropical Africa. Sapele is a commercially important wood that is reminiscent of mahogany, a member of the same family. It typically has a distinctive figure and is used where figure is important. The demand for sapele, often marketed as "African mahogany," has increased sharply as a mahogany substitute in recent years. Among its more exotic uses is that in musical instruments. It is used for the back and sides of acoustic guitar bodies, as well as the bodies of electric guitars. It is also used in manufacturing the neck piece of ukuleles and 26-and 36-string harps.

#### JACOBA Wood (taken from The Wood Database)

Common names: Jatoba and Brazilian Cherry. Native to: Central America, Southern Mexico, Northern South America, and the West Indies. Heartwood varies from a light orangish brown to a darker reddish brown, sometimes with contrasting darker grayish brown streaks. Color tends to darken upon exposure to light. It is considered difficult to work with on account of its density and hardness, and has a moderate blunting effect on tool cutters. Jatoba also tends to be difficult to plane without tear-out due to its interlocking grain. However, Jatoba glues, stains, turns, and finishes well. Also, it responds well to steam-bending.
