

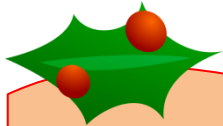

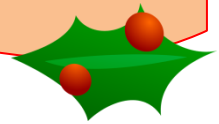
## GCW Newsletter Brief:

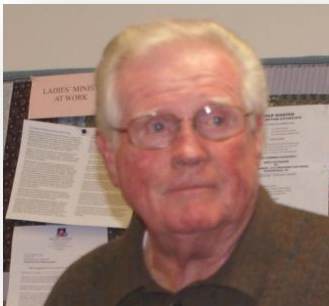


**December 10<sup>th</sup> will be the annual “bring your spouse/special guest” meeting. Be sure to come and participate in the fun.**

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## November Round Tables:



Our November round table event is always a big hit. During our regular meetings our members have limited chances to discuss woodworking concepts and exchange ideas in any detail. This round table meeting enabled them to do just that. There were a number of tables each set up with specific topics to get things rolling. Each table had a lead presenter and included demonstrations plus examples. In addition, on the side, many members were able to mentor fellow members one on one.

Mark Betzler led a presentation and discussion generally on lathe topics. One focus was on a table saw jig used to cut accurate angles. In this case the objective was to show how the jig can be used to cut accurate segments for segmented turnings. This was a popular table as cutting accurate angles for any project can define the relative success of a project.

Homer Rail headed up a table that covered creating mortise and tenons. He demonstrated and showed a video of a special jig for making mortises using a plunge router for both 1/2" and 1/4" mortises. In addition he demonstrated using loose tenons. He also had an old Craftsman tenoning jig for cutting tenons on hand to demonstrate.

Tim Bynon hosted a table showing a 48 x 12 inch jig that can create curvatures using adjustable clamps for laminating wood model airplane wing spars. The jig could also be used to build a traditional balsa construction wing, as in a elliptical dihedral (an angle at which the right and left wings are inclined upward or downward).

Also shown was a test set-up for checking the amount of deflection under varying loads for experimental spars. The table also had examples of some triple expanding craft storage cabinet ideas.

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## Show-N-Tell (12 members):

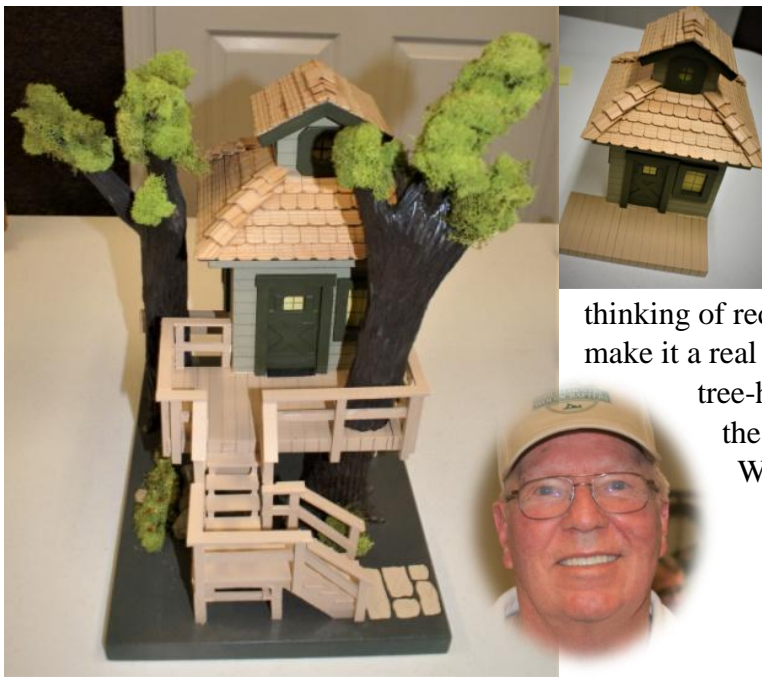
### Sam Garcia



Sam brought in his latest turning. This segmented bowl uses Walnut and Ash. Note the Walnut segments are 2 times the size of the Ash. He plans to create another bowl reversing the size configuration. He used Tried & True Original Wood Finish. This is a food-safe product and can be found at Woodcraft. Sam is becoming quite the wood craftsman. Be sure to give him an attaboy when you see him.

Sam has been asked if he would like to sell his work. He is actually considering it.

### Rich Nielson



We saw the beginnings of this project at the October project challenge. He showed what he described as tree-house that was constructed with just one 2x4? It was build to 1/2 inch per foot scale. At that time he said the challenge was making the shingles. When he presented his project he was thinking of redefining it as a shed as he ran out of time to make it a real tree-house. Well, he finished turning it into a tree-house after all. The trees were fabricated with the help of a Dremel Tool and he used Bass Wood to make the stairs.

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## Mark Butzler



Mark has been busy to say the least. He brought 4 projects to share. The item, upper left, is a knitting bowl (also called a yarn bowl). This is a popular item with the ladies who knit.

Using the bowl to hold the yarn keeps the yarn ball from getting away or tangling up “and away from the cat”. The 3 cutting boards all feature end-grain oriented segments. He used Walnut as the primary wood for all these. The cutting boards were finished using mineral oil. All these projects are destined as Christmas gifts.

## Don Lawson



Don brought his latest carving. This is a serving tray he carved from a single piece of pine. The tools used were primarily a chisel and mallet. He used a Dremel tool to add texture to the piece. For the finish he used a wipe on polyurethane with stain. The tapered outside edges were cut on a

table saw after carving as it would have been difficult to carve if already tapered. The project took about 1 week.



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## *Ron Sexton*



Ron has progressed in his carving efforts to the point where he needed a carving stand. The stand can be adjusted to accommodate just about any position needed during the carving project. The subject carving is mounted by bolting it to the stand head. The stand can be clamped to the table/bench and be adjusted for the needed height. He found the needed parts at Tractor Supply in Placerville for about \$6. The horse head, in its beginning stages, is Claro Walnut. He will primarily be using power carving to shape the head. We're looking forward to seeing the finished carving.



## *Homer Rail*



Homer brought in an interesting item. It is an old "gate latch" made of Oak that no longer works well. He made a new one mounted to the gate in the picture. The dowel is held in place by the spring action of the Oak stick. The stick has enough spring to allow the dowel to be pulled back releasing the gate. The old one lasted 20 years!



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## Gail Brooks



Gail Brooks, one of our newest members, is already becoming a regular at our Show-N-Tells. She brought in her 2 latest projects. The one on the left is an unknown wood that she recovered from a lake during a recent Kayaking outing. It had a large branch attached which she removed. After cleaning it up and sanding she added character and contrast by burning. She used wax as the final finish. The piece on the right is maple Burl carved using an angle grinder to create, what else, a maple leaf. For the finish she used Watco Danish Oil.

## Craig Milliron



Beer and wine must be popular in Craig's household. He turned 2 bottle openers and 4 wine stoppers using various wood species, each with a unique shape. Unlike standard metal stoppers these stand on their own, so there is no need for a stopper mount. He used Waterlox Tung Oil for the finish.

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## Gail Cone



Gail brought in 5+ projects, 2 vases, stopper stand w/3 stoppers, and 2 three dimensional Tic-Tac-Toe games. The smaller vase is Red Ash w/Mosquet accent, the larger is Walnut with Maple accent. Both turnings are thin wall, approx. 3/16". The stopper stand primary wood is Walnut. The stoppers are all made from woods stabilized using liquid plastic resin (some tinted with dye). The turnings were finished using CA. The 2 games were turned from Walnut rounds (11") harvested about 4 years ago. The center is Maple w/Walnut. The Pins (16 each game) are 1/8" stainless steel (cut and polished in shop). Each

game requires 64 beads (32 dark, 32 light). Watco "rattle can" spray clear lacquer was used as the finish for the vases, stand and games.

## Victor Larson



Stoppers R Us. Victor turned a number of stoppers with the intention of selling them at a craft fair. He even created a fine stopper display for the event. He said that it took about 1/2 hour each to turn the stoppers. Even though these stoppers are hand crafted and one of a kind items, he was unable to sell any. Such is the world of craft fairs.

The 3 live edge bowls were green turned from Blue Oak. Victor explained that Blue Oak grows in relatively arid areas so

the growth rings are very tight. Each bowl has a slightly oval shape resulting from the wood continuing to lose moisture. Victor finished the bowls using his own formula, part poly, linseed, and mineral oil. The mineral oil gives the pieces a soft/silky feel.



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*Frank Frantino*



Frank brought 3 bowls 1 Oak and 2 Cocobolo. The Oak bowl had a number of voids which he filled using a combination of real and “fake” turquoise. He said he used to toss wood that had defects until he learned that the defects offered an opportunity to create unique wood art. He finished the pieces using friction polish.

Bill brought in 2 of his latest projects. The cutting board woods are Cherry, Maple and Purple Heart. It is about 15” x 10”. The book ends are Walnut, Purple Heart and Maple. These were finished using Formby’s Tung Oil.
