### Show and Tell (9 entries):

Jim Hunt



Jim brought in his latest turnings to share with the members. It is obvious that Jim has segmented turning mastered as one turning was a segmented salad bowl with Beech, Walnut, Paduk and Wenge woods. It featured a matching segmented lid. One key observation was that paduck mellows out into a walnut color over time. Basil Borkert suggested that a finish with an inhibitor that would help prevent that. Jim was not sure if anything like that is avail in food grade. The other turning is a natural

edge vase turned from a dead, Spalted Oak branch salvaged from the wood pile. The key was to find a piece where the bark would stay intact while turning.

Our Intarsia master, Ed Woodards, showed our members another fine Intarsia piece he recently completed. This one of a palm tree and birds required approximately 70 pieces. The woods used included basswood, oak, redwood, mahogany, etc. He started it in August and finished it just before the October meeting. This one is a birthday gift for his daughter.

#### Victor Larson (newest member)



Victor brought in a number of bandsaw boxes to share with our members and gave a brief description of the procedures he followed to make them.

These boxes were inspired by accomplished woodworker/instructor Michael Cullen. Each box is made from a single block of wood.

All cuts are done using the bandsaw, allowing him to shape and create on the fly.

The steps he followed: 1) Slice off a piece to be the top. 2) Set the saw at a slight angle and slice off the two opposite sides with the tapers toward the inside. 3) Slice the two ends the same leaving a center core with all sides tapered. 4) From

the core slice a thin piece of the top to be glued to the bottom of the top. This will register top to box. 5) Slice a piece from bottom of core to be bottom of box. 6) Glue all together and you have a basic box. 7) Now shape the outside. 8) Carve and paint to ones creative whims.
