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### The Paint Spot Presentation:



For the September meeting we had a presentation on a woodworker's most favorite topic, finishes and finishing. To cover this topic we were fortunate to have Ryan Webb from the Paint Spot provide us with the latest on available finishes, their characteristics and usage. The Paint Spot is a family owned business and has 2 locations, one in Placerville and one in Shingle Springs. Ryan represents the third generation in the Paint Spot family serving our area. If you missed the September meeting you really missed out.

This write up cannot even come close to covering all the information included in Ryan's talk. Here's just a little taste of what was covered from what I could glean from my sparse notes. He included staining in his talk and touched on several areas that impact the stain's absorption and color on wood. These include the wood grain, species and how the surface is prepared. Results can vary significantly depending on the type of stain, level of sanding, sealing and recoating/re-brushing. He noted that Water based stains penetrate much better than oils. Also it was recommended that you should wait at least 24 hrs before applying any clear coat and applying thin coats is best. In covering clear coats, he noted the following: Oil based finishes tend to add an orange tint whereas water base tend to be clear. Polyurethanes hardness and UV protection holds up better than water base. Also, in general oil base finishes tend to adhere better than water base finishes.

Our members were able to ask lots of questions that Ryan fielded very well and that prompted much dialog. It was obvious that our members welcomed this presentation and got a lot out of it.

If you need stains, finishing products or just paint, be sure to stop by one of their Paint Spot stores. They are very knowledgeable and are ready to help. If you are trying to match previously stained or finished items, or just have a finishing question be sure to consult with them. One of their services includes stain/color matching. Oh, and don't forget to mention you are a GCW member to get your member discount.

#### RINGMASTER MACHINE AVAILABLE.

I recently acquired this RINGMASTER, but find that I just don't have room for another tool in my shop. I already have a Nova lathe that does what I want to do. The Ringmaster unit is Serial Number 00176 and appears to be in good working condition. The unit is really clean and includes the original owner's manual. I have not yet plugged it in, but the previous owner apparently used it often. He built the little cabinet and added a foot-control switch to the setup. Online sellers are asking from \$350 and up. Ringmaster is currently out of stock and they have a waiting list for new machines that sell new from \$540-\$814 depending on the model.

Here is a bit more information about the Ringmaster unit. Ringmaster is a device that will allow you to cut a 12"x12" board, up to 1 1/4" thick stacking rings that make a bowl, vase or other round object of multiple rings. Once glued together using the Ringmaster, you can finish-turning, sand and finish the assembly. There are countless YouTube videos showing the process and examples. The unknown wood I utilized for this vessel was very boring, so to create interest I burned vertical lines following the grain pattern to maintain an organic feel. I continued on to use various wood burning tips to burn a variety of designs. The collar was turned from Walnut and darkened with a tannin solution. I finished it with rattle can lacquer.

Here are my projects shown at the September Show-N-Tell. The first one is a bug motel designed to attract pollinating insects for the garden. The small tubes are cardboard tubes that I ordered from Amazon. The larger ones are 2 inch dowels. The tubes are nesting areas for bees and other flying insects. The red doors are butterfly nesting areas. The second project is a multi layered clock. Each layer was cut out on my laser cutter. I dyed each layer a different color for contrast before I glued them together.

Shown here are the projects I presented at the September meeting. First was a homemade vortex turning tool, patterned after a Stuart Batty creation. I used 1/4" high speed steel ground flat on the top and with an included bevel angle of 25 degrees to reach into tight areas when spindle turning. The handle is Walnut and is finished with lacquer.

The box I made for my wife for storing remotes. It is all Walnut, measures 12" x 12" x 3" and is joined using 1/4" box joints. The top was beveled using the table saw. For the finish I used a wipe on poly.

Here are the 2 ornaments I showed at the September meeting. Both have a Walnut body with Ebony finials. They were finished with Danish oil (natural) and Min Wax rattle can clear gloss lacquer. The picture in the middle shows an example of the hangers that I found for them.

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#### Ron Sexton



This is my latest plate project I showed at the September meeting. I turned a 10" Silver Maple plate, then drew my design on it and proceeded to carve out the design using carving chisels and Dremel using a 1/8" bit. Then my dog and I went to the American River and gathered some rock. After that we walked the rail line East of Greenstone road and found some green rock to use for the leaves. I also used some Serpentine and some Red Jasper from my property. The various rocks were then crushed and graded to size, glued into the carved out design, ground down flat and then fine sanded everything. The finish is of course lacquer.

The southwest design vessel is 8" in diameter and 6" tall. The woods used were Purple Heart, Maple and Wenge. It has a salad bowl finish. The boxes are pocket watch hinged boxes made with Ambrosia Maple and Walnut. All were finished using poly.
